A recorder is an invaluable tool for language educators. Pre-recording listening exercises allows teachers to move around the classroom while students complete them. You can record other native English speakers reading passages to help students practice listening to speakers with different accents.

Provide students with opportunities to practice note taking during listening activities. Guide them to focus on capturing key information rather than verbatim transcription. Assist them in understanding the speaker's intended meaning. A summary of such advice includes:

- a) Numerical sentences like "There are two reasons..."
- b) Rhetorical questions
- c) Introductory conclusions: "Let me first explain...The topic I want to discuss is interesting because..."

- d) "Another reason..." develop an idea expressed by sentences like; "On the one hand... "; "Therefore..." and so on.
- e) "We focus on..." and others.
- f) "First..." A chronology of thoughts marked "Next"; "Finally,..."; and others.
- g) Emphasis of ideas such as "This is important because..." "The important results were..." "Let me repeat..." etc.
- h) "In conclusion..." "As I have shown..." a summary of the ideas expressed by etc.

Incorporate visuals whenever possible into listening exercises.

Students may also need help learning to read graphics (maps, charts, etc.) due to limited prior exposure to such skills. Listening comprehension exercises demonstrate how visual data can be interpreted and analyzed.
