Literature Review

The United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) has been more focused on human development, emphasizing the interconnectedness of economic, social, and environmental factors in the fight against poverty (UNDP, 2018). Banik (2016) argues that the success of international organizations in poverty reduction often depends on the degree of alignment between international initiatives and local policy frameworks.

For Uzbekistan, Akbarov (2019) points out that international support, particularly from the World Bank, has been critical in financing major infrastructure projects and economic reforms. However, Kadirov (2020) highlights that the country's efforts to reduce poverty face challenges, including insufficient diversification of its economy and unequal distribution of resources between urban and rural areas. Thus, while international organizations contribute significantly, national ownership and context-specific policies remain crucial for success.

Discussion

guidance on currency devaluation and monetary policy helped Uzbekistan achieve a more stable and competitive economy. This stability is necessary for attracting foreign investment and creating the conditions for sustainable poverty reduction.

The Role of the UNDP

The UNDP's approach to poverty reduction is notably broader than that of the World Bank or IMF, as it focuses on human development in its entirety, including education, health, gender equality, and environmental sustainability. The UNDP has supported Uzbekistan's efforts to integrate sustainable development into its poverty reduction strategies, with particular emphasis on social protection systems and inclusive growth.

A key UNDP initiative is the Human Development Index (HDI), which tracks poverty not just through income but through access to education and healthcare. The UNDP has worked with Uzbekistan to improve social welfare programs and encourage policies that prioritize the most marginalized groups. These initiatives are crucial in reducing multi-dimensional poverty and ensuring that development benefits reach all segments of society.
